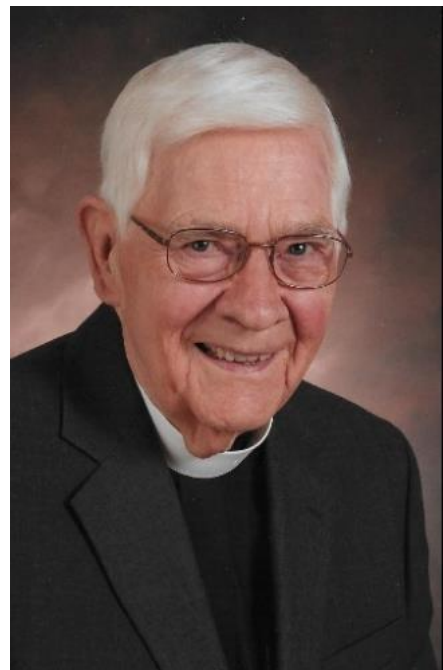
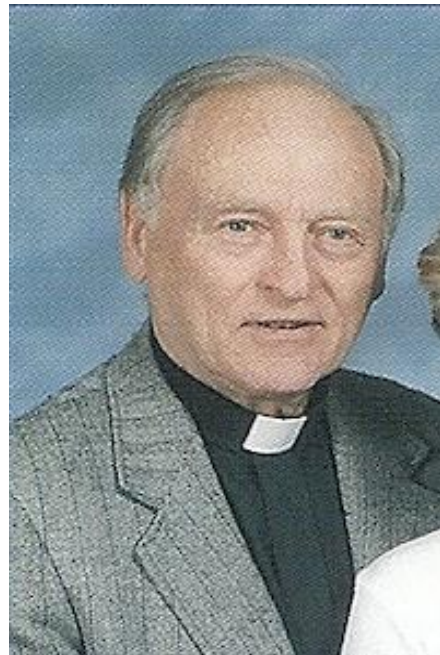

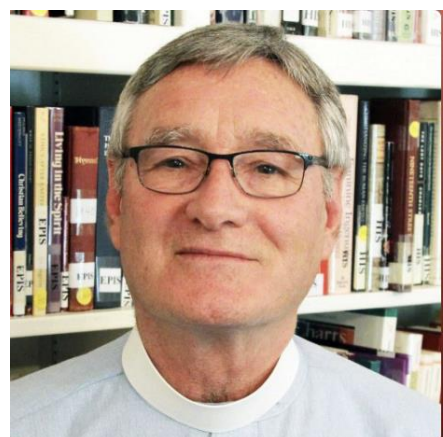

Founders of Grace

Soon after Bishop Scadding arrived in the Diocese, he received many requests that a parish be started in the Irvington area. He assigned Rev. George B. Van Waters, D.D., who had recently retired as rector of St. David's Parish, to take charge of the work. Mrs. Angeline Berry had been an active member of St. David's Parish for 25 years, and was the widow of the late Fredrick W. Berry who had served as vestry member there for 19 years. She immediately offered to purchase the land and give additional funds toward the founding of the parish. The main condition of her offer was that Dr. Van Waters continue to oversee the new parish.

Fredrick and Angeline Berry, and also Dr. Van Waters, had come to the Northwest from the East around 1890. All three had spent many years of involvement in civic activities and Church proceedings at a Diocesan level. Four of Grace's first Vestry members were either Vestry members or very involved members at St. David's. Many of Grace's first congregational members came directly from St. David's, with some already living in the Irvington neighborhood.

"...a meeting was held during December 1908 at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Wrenn, located at the southwest corner of North 12th Avenue and Hancock Street..." to formulate plans for the new church. On Monday, Dec. 28, 1908, Mrs. Berry made final the purchase of two lots at the corner of N.E. 17th Ave. & Weidler St. She then arranged for the temporary building to be set up for the opening service of Grace Memorial Protestant Episcopal Church. On Sunday, Jan. 3, 1909, Dr. Van Waters officiated the first service, which was Holy Communion, at 10:30 am. Services were conducted in the temporary building every Sunday through May 29, at which time the first parish house was completed enough to be put into use.

Angeline Berry

Born: December 9, 1843

Pine Township, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania

Died: August 4, 1902 (aged 76), Portland, Oregon

Mrs. Angeline Berry and her husband, Fredrick, came to Portland immediately following their marriage in May of 1883. Angeline became a prominent civic worker within the Portland community. She was noted as founder and vice-president of the local Humane Society, as well as one of the founders of Good Samaritan Hospital and the local YWCA. She was also an active member of St. David's Episcopal Church for 25 years. She held various offices in St. David's Chapter of the Women's Auxiliary, as well as various offices of the Auxiliary at a Diocesan level.

Her husband, Fredrick, had a very successful store which sold paper, cardboard boxes, string, and such commodities, and was located at S.W. Ankeny & Front Streets, where the downtown fire station is now located. He helped to found the Columbia Chapter of the Masonic Lodge, and also had been a member of St. David's vestry for 19 years. He had spent many years involved with the missionary work of the Episcopal Church, both in New York and in Oregon. He was publicly well known for his spiritual life.

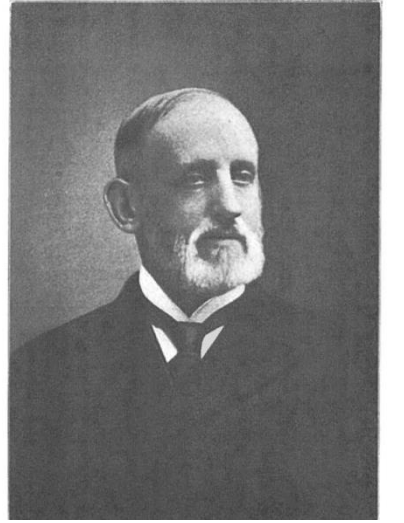
Angeline immediately organized a local chapter of the Women's Auxiliary at the new church. She was elected "to sit in the chair" as President for 9 consecutive years, while continuing to hold offices at a Diocesan level. At the time of her death in August 1920, she bequeathed \$8,000 (now equivalent to some \$200,000) to the Foreign and Domestic Missions of the Episcopal Church for the purpose of maintaining Bible readers in China. On the western face of Angeline and Fredrick's grave monument now located in Lone Fir Cemetery is written the quotation: "Holy, and Humble of Heart, I Will Give Unto Thee a Crown of Life."

On Easter Eve there passed away a devoted friend and worshipper of St. David's Church. For 18 years the late F. W. Berry served the Parish in the capacity of Vestryman, Clerk, Treasurer and Junior Warden. In many ways he manifested his interest in its welfare. A regular attendant at the Offices of the Church he always showed his keen appreciation of whatever was done to help on the work of the Parish. He will be greatly missed and the sympathy of all goes out to Mrs. Berry and her only daughter, Ellen, in their sad bereavement. The latter is now at Costa Rica, C. A. her husband the Rev. W. S. Cooper, being engaged in missionary work under Bishop of Honduras. A large congregation attended the funeral services held at St. David's on the Monday in Easter week. Appropriate music was rendered by a quintette of voices. The interment took place at Lone Fir Cemetery with full Masonic honors. Dr. S. E. Josephi and Whitney L. Boise, members of St. David's Vestry were among the pallbearers.

Boyhood of Mr. Berry

FREDERICK WILLIAM BERRY

BURIED: Lone Fir Cemetery
Grave 1 North, Lot 46, Block 8
April 16th, 1906

"Thrift of time," said William E. Gladstone, "will repay you in future life with the usury of prosperity beyond your most sanguine dreams, and waste of it will make you dwindle alike in intellectual and moral stature beyond your darkest reckoning." Every man as he approaches middle life realizes the truth of these words of England's great scholar and statesman. Time is the chief asset most young men have to start life with, and the use the young man makes of it determines, as a rule, his success in life. Nowhere in the world can time be used to more advantage than in America, which Emerson declared, "Is another name for opportunity." It was the advantages offered by the New World that led Frederick William Berry to come to the United States, and as the years past by he attained those material interests which work for success and at the same time developed character of such excellence that his name is yet honored and his memory cherished by all who knew him.

Mr. Berry was born at Lewes, Sussex, England, December 26th, 1841, and through his father, Thomas Berry, was descended from Duc Charles Ferdinand de Berry. The name was later anglicized to its present form. His paternal grandmother, Mrs. Elizabeth Berry nee Adams, was of the family that gave us our American Presidents of that name. His mother, who was in her maidenhood was Rebecca Mercy Ade, was a pure anglo saxon descent.

The boyhood of Frederick W. Berry was spent in the picturesque and historical town of Lewes where his father was a merchant. He was there being educated as a week day boarder at the Lewes Grammar School when his apparent throat trouble and delicate constitution gave his parents much uneasiness. Because of this his father put him, at the early age of 13 years, under the care of an old friend, a sea captain, who took him for a year's cruise around the world. The boy returned very much benefited and thoroughly in love with the life of the sea. After persistent persuasion upon his part, his parents consented to his "adopting the seaman's life for a time." Before long he had an appointment as midshipman on the Victoria, the pioneer Australian navy vessel of the English Navy. He became very much attached to the Victoria, on which he served for some years, and brought to America a handsome steel engraving of the vessel which hung in his bedroom until the time of his death. At the age of 21 he left the sea and soon thereafter married Miss Ellen Sawyer, of Brighton, a daughter of David Sawyer, of that city. In the meantime Mr. Berry's father had removed his business to Brighton and there he and his wife died soon after their son's marriage. Frederick Berry and his brother, Theophilus, then succeeded to and carried on their father's business, but another great sorrow early overtook the former in the death of his young wife, leaving him with a little daughter of four years. Feeling unsettled thereafter and with a strong desire for a change, after two years, after arranging to leave his daughter, Nellie, in the care of an aunt, he left England for America. Soon after arriving in New York he associated himself with Paul Mackie and other gentlemen of that city who were forming a company and fitting out a vessel to engage in the rubber trade at Para, South America. And enjoyable outing of nearly a year

with its varied experiences was about the only asset the company derived from that expedition.

Returning to New York, Mr. Berry became associated with James Stewart Mackie in the asbestos business. On May 1, 1883, he married Miss Angeline Anderson of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, who for some years prior to her marriage was principal of the Sterrett Public School at Pittsburgh. In July of the following year, they left New York and came to Portland, Oregon purchasing a home at number 600 East Oak Street, where Mr. Berry resided continuously until his death in April, 1906. He embarked in the asbestos business, but the Northwest was not educated to the use of that material to a degree demanding its use sufficiently to make business profitable, and he then turned his attention to the general commission business, working persistently, cheerfully and hopefully. He carefully conducted his interest in that line and won gratifying success.

Many were the letters that he found time to write, even in his busy life, to his English and Eastern friends, for his "was the pen of a ready writer." He dwelt on the beauty and promise of this "garden of the World," and more than a score of Portland people now testify that it was his influence that brought them to the Northwest. He was always a cheerless, tireless worker, not only along business lines but in the broader and better field of man's humanity to man and the Master's service. No just appeal was ever made to him in vain if he could meet it, and he did not let his left hand know what his right was doing. He was especially fond of little children and of animals, the former recognizing in him a friend, the latter a protector. He had little time for social organizations, but was a Mason and helped to found Columbia Lodge of Portland, serving for a time as its secretary. Beside constant activities in church missionary service in New York City, he served for nineteen years as vestryman at the St. David's Church in Portland. His nature displayed a fine blending of gentleness and strength which formed a character of rare symmetry. Upon the foundation of implicit faith in God and courage to walk with unfaltering step the path appointed to his feet was reared in noble life.

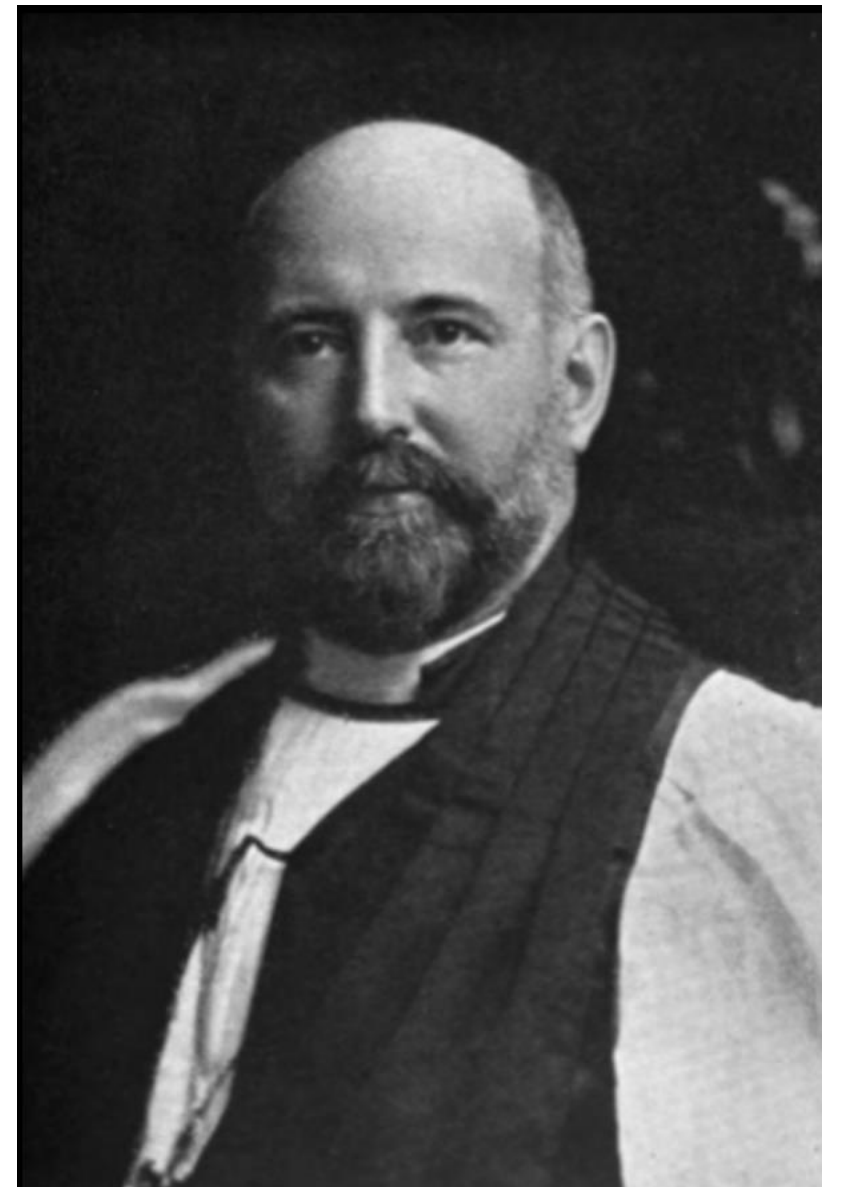

My dear Mrs. Berry :-

At the first of the New Year let me thank you for your generous gift of the past week in buying a lot for the proposed Grace Memorial Church in Irvington. I hope that in due time many other memorials may be secured so that it may be in every way a "memorial" church. For the present 17th and Weidler is very central, but looking into the future I could have wished the location nearer 25th and Thompson or Knott, but I suppose building restrictions prevented Dr. Van Waters going there. I fear that the notices in the Newspapers on Saturday are a little premature, for although it is clearly opportune to have a church in Irvington, and I shall help Dr. Van Waters in every way to build one up, yet before any place can be officially accepted the matter has to come before the Standing Committee for action according to the general canons of the Church. However this need in no way prevent the mission work going on in the temporary tent building. Wishing you all possible happiness in the New Year, and every blessing for many years

Mrs. Berry's love of cars

Despite her “three-score years and ten,” Mrs. F. W. Berry, of 490 East Oak Street, is an enthusiastic motorist, owns her own car and drives it everywhere about the city, weaving skillfully through the crowded traffic of the downtown district, or indulging in an exhilarating bit of swift speeding when the way is clear out on some smooth, hard-surfaced avenue of the residence districts.

Mrs. Berry is several months past 70 years of age, but in her youthfulness of spirit and the sweet wholesomeness of her kindly and sympathetic outlook on life, she has retained a buoyancy and an energy that would do credit to a woman of less than half her years. Just recently she returned from a year's journey around the world – a remarkable feat in itself for one of her age, since she went unaccompanied and negotiated all the difficulties of the trip by herself. The tour was made entirely for pleasure and Mrs. Berry traveled in a leisurely way, taking in all the important points of interest and enjoying every minute of the trip. She returned by way of Japan and spent many delightful weeks traveling in the Orient.

While abroad she made many side tours by automobile and found such delight traveling by the luxurious medium of the motor that she determined to purchase a car for herself upon her return to Portland and learn to operate it. This she lost no time in doing and within a fortnight after arriving in her home city, she had selected a note-and-open Babcock electric and was busily engaged in learning how to drive it. With the buoyant enthusiasm that has been so characteristic of all that she had done in her long and useful life, Mrs. Berry quickly mastered the task she had set herself and in a short time she skillfully driving her smart motor everywhere in the city, picking up invalid friends and taking them for afternoon airings, or whisking some over-engrossed matron and mother away from her too earnest domesticity for an hour or so of refreshing recreation. Ms. Berry never misses a fine day and seldom goes alone for her outing in her swift little motor, she is of that unselfish type who finds her pleasure doubled when it is shared with someone else, and she is greatly loved for her rare thoughtfulness and consideration by all who know her. The septuagenarian motorist is an active member and an officer of the Oregon Humane Society and is permanently identified with church work. Through her personal efforts and her generous individual endowment, funds were raised for the building of the Grace Memorial Episcopal Church in Irvington as a memorial to her deceased husband, Frank W. Berry, who was one of Oregon's respected pioneers. Mrs. Berry is active of the woman's auxiliary connected with the church, and is an energetic worker in that organization, besides being active in the affairs of the Humane Society.

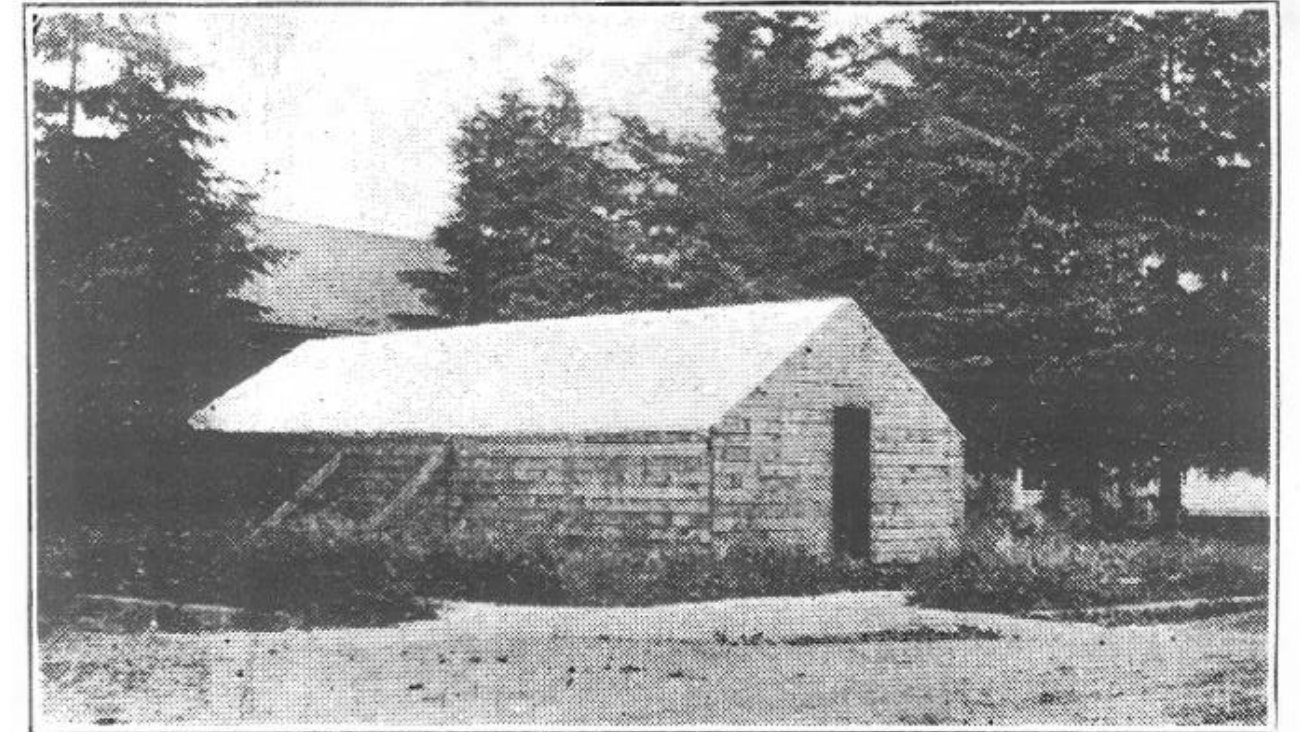


The **Ford Model T** is an automobile that was produced by the Ford Motor Company from October 1, 1908, to May 26, 1927.

COUNTY PAYROLL \$18,000 MONTHLY

Other Expenses Bring Total
Paid Out Well Above the
\$46,000 Mark.

POOR FARM IS EXPENSIVE

Total Cost Is Close to \$5000 a
Month, Half of Which Goes for
Salaries—Charges Do Nothing
to Lessen Tax Burden.

In addition to the city's public salary roll of \$75,000 a month, that of the county amounts to more than \$18,000. During the month of December, the county disbursed, to meet November claims, \$18,721. Maintenance of ferries and bridges costs between \$2000 and \$3000 a month. The Assessor's office averages \$2000, and Assessor Sigler's salary is to be raised from \$2000 to \$2750 beginning this year. The office of County Clerk averages nearly \$2000 a month. The District Attorney and his deputies and assistants average \$1500 a month, without the pay increase for which they are asking.

One of the very heavy burdens is that of the Poor Farm, which in November cost \$4527, the salaries alone amounting to \$2527. The paid employees number 25 and the institution's inmates do practically nothing to defray its expenses. In November potatoes cost 20c.

The Juvenile Court costs taxpayers close to \$2000 a month for salaries of regular employees and for fees of witnesses. Janitor service in the Courthouse is heavy, costing \$400 a month. Miscellaneous expenses for the Courthouse in November amounted to \$400 more.

NEW CHURCH IN IRVINGTON

Mrs. W. F. Berry Gives Money for
Episcopal Edifice.

Very shortly after the arrival of Bishop Summing to this diocese he was impressed with the importance of establishing a church in Irvington. Some months ago he invited the Rev. Dr. Van Waters to look over the field, and after the latter's retirement from the rectorship of St. David's Church, he placed the matter in his hands. Mrs. F. W. Berry immediately offered to give \$5000. Mrs. Berry has been a communicant and active worker in St. David's Church for 25 years. The late F. W. Berry, her husband, served in the vestry for 19 years and is known for his devotion to his church and for his spiritual life. It was in memory of her husband and with the condition that Dr. Van Waters should take charge of the work that the offering was made.

A quarter block has been purchased on the southwest corner of East Seventeenth and Weidler streets, and a parish house is to be built at once. The church is to be known as Grace Memorial Church. Arrangements are being made for a temporary place of worship to be used during the construction of the parish house. Services will be held every Sunday at 10:30 A. M., beginning with the first Sunday of the New Year.

Services will be held tomorrow morning at 10:30 at East Seventeenth and Weidler streets, Irvington. A new Sunday school will be organized at noon. Temporary quarters will be provided until a church and parish house can be erected.

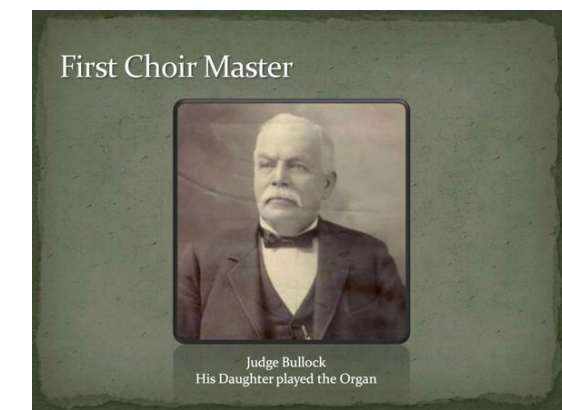


Grace Memorial's annual Christmas Bazaar has been one of the longest-running events and also one of the best known outside the parish. In 1920, one was held at the old Portland Hotel, which included an afternoon tea. By the end of World War 2 it had become an elaborate affair. In 1943, a musical waxworks was included; a Smorgasbord dinner was part of the '46 Bazaar. In 1954, there was a luncheon and a tea and a dinner, but in 1955, there were more workers than customers due to a snowstorm. Theme of the 1958 Bazaar was "Golden Glow" in honor of the parish's 50th anniversary. In 1958, Thomas Opdenweyer designed the attractive booths which are still in use. – written in 1976.

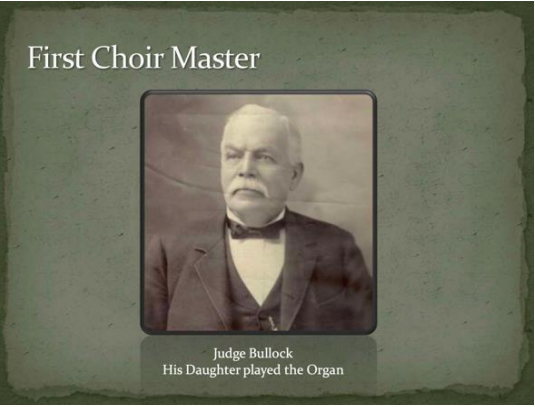

Death Takes Noted Organist After Long Musical Career

Frederick W. Goodrich, 85, Portland organist, who for more than 45 years was a leading figure in the city’s musical life, died Friday at a local hospital after an extended illness.

Mr. Goodrich was born in Norfolk, England, October 19, 1866. In 1899 in Northwold, Norfolk County, England, he married Alice Thorpe, with whom he celebrated the golden anniversary of their marriage July 5, 1949.

Mr. Goodrich held his first position as a London church organist at 18 and played in several leading London churches before coming to Portland in 1904 as organist at St. David’s Episcopal church. He was organist for the Lewis and Clark fair in 1905 and was a guest organist at the San Francisco world’s fair in 1915. From 1907 to 1934 he was organist at St. Mary’s Catholic cathedral (Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception) and later, until his retirement in 1949, he was at Grace Memorial Episcopal church.

Lecturer Role Recalled: Becoming associated with the Portland Symphony orchestra in its early years as organist and lecturer, Mr. Goodrich wrote its program notes for 19 years as a voluntary service. One of his compositions, the second movement of his Hebrew symphony, was played by the orchestra during its 1948-49 season.

For 18 years he was on the music faculty of the Portland Extension center of the Oregon state system of higher education and at various times was musical lecturer at St. Mary’s academy, Academy of the Holy Child, Columbia university, now the University of Portland, and at St. Helen’s hall junior college. During the depression years, he was Oregon state director of the WPA federal music project.

Mr. Goodrich was one of the founders and a life member of the Oregon Music Teachers’ Association and was its president four times. He was cofounder and four years dean of the Oregon chapter, American Guild of Organists, a founder, and ex-president of the Musician’s club of Portland and for five years was chairman of the music committee of the Library association of Portland. He was a member of the Musicians’ Mutual association.

State Post Held: He was one of the original committee appointed by the state superintendent of public instruction to assist in the accrediting of music teachers and served 10 years as the committee’s secretary. Recognized as an authority on church music, particularly that of the Catholic and Episcopal churches, Mr. Goodrich was invited to become a member of the advisory council of the Catholic Society of St. Gregory of America. He dedicated many church organs in the Northwest as well as the public auditorium organ in Portland. He was a member of Portland lodge of Elks and of Trinity Episcopal church. The family home is at 730 N. W. 20th avenue. Survivors in addition to the widow, include a daughter, Mrs. Owen S. Cowling, club editor of the Oregonian; two sons, Norbert D., Portland, and Francis J., La Conner, Wash., and two grandchildren, Candice and Thorpe Goodrich. Funeral arrangements are in charge of Colonial Mortuary.

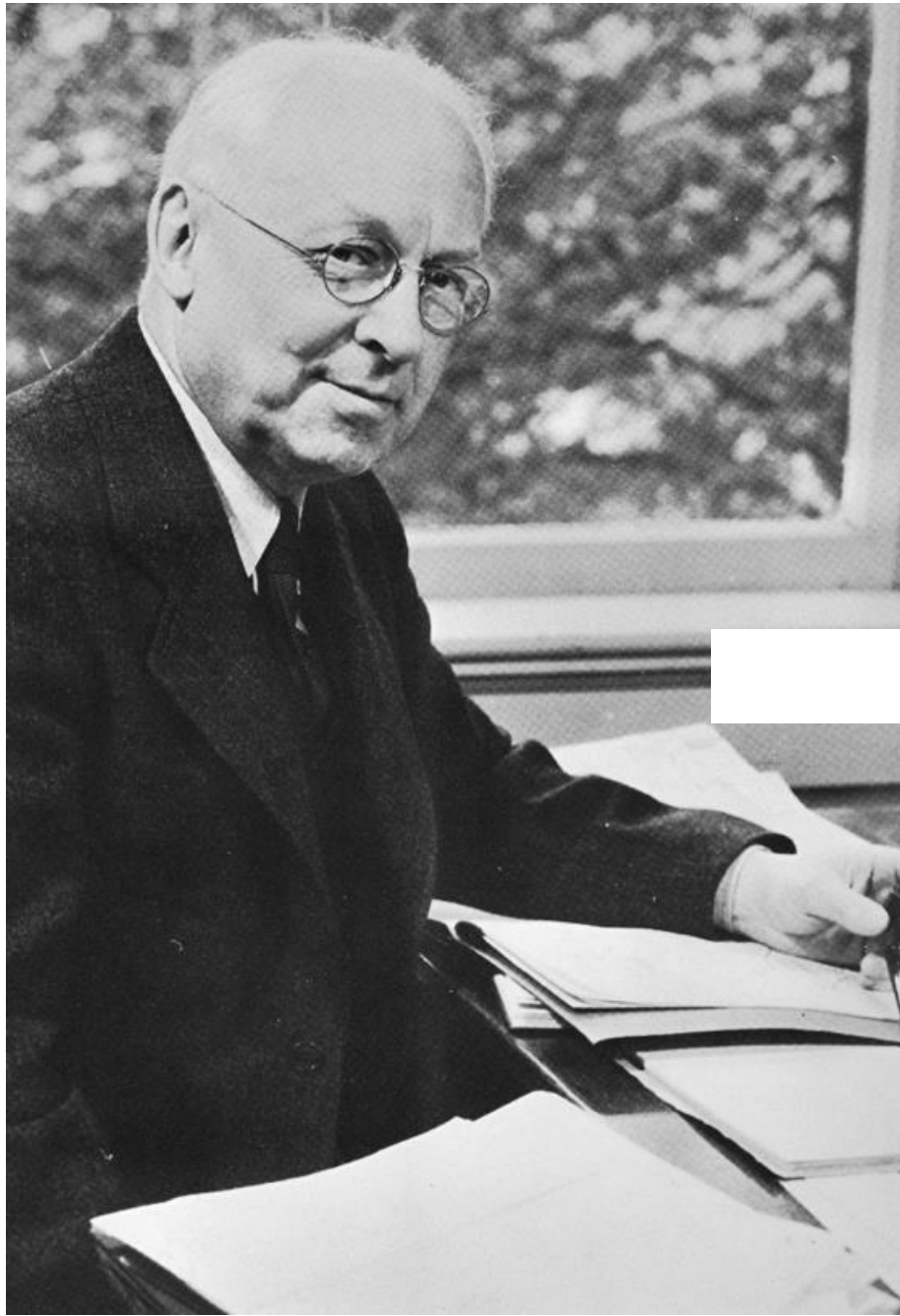

The present Church building was completed some 18 years after the Church's founding. It is an authentic reproduction of a small, naturally lit, English-Gothic country church. The structure is long, narrow, and tall and is formed in the traditional shape of the cross. Many people refer to it as "just like being in a big old ship." The original plans for the church were drawn up in 1920 and called for a more ornate brick building. Because Angeline Berry had put the Parish's first two lots in trust with a condition that no debts could be incurred on the land, the Grace Memorial Vestry had to wait until 1926 to begin construction of the main Church building. By that time, the Parish was able to build the Church using structurally superior and very economical reinforced concrete, at two-thirds of the originally estimated cost. Thus, the Parish now enjoys a very solid, smooth, sleek, light, acoustically charming sanctuary which was practically paid for at the time of its construction. Due in part to the financially reserved character that Angeline Berry had written into the original property deed, Grace Memorial has typically practiced the quality of moderation in all of her affairs. Parish members have never been burdened with the pressure of huge debts, as has occurred in other parishes.

Portland architect Ellis Fuller Lawrence was the leading organizer of his profession in Oregon in the early years of the twentieth century.

Of the more than five hundred projects attributed to Lawrence and his associates, 40 percent were residential works in Art and Crafts, Colonial Revival, and varied historic period styles. Some of his later work, including public buildings and commercial and industrial projects, took on a modern sensibility.

The architect's works on the University of Oregon campus include Gerlinger Hall and the Women's Quadrangle (1917-1921), the Museum of Art (1930), and the library (1939). The Lawrence-designed architecture building, together with its early additions, was considerably enlarged by modern facilities and rededicated in 1958 as Lawrence Hall.

In Portland, the Albina Branch Library (1912), Westminster Presbyterian Church (1914), Riverview Cemetery caretaker's house (1914), and the University of Oregon Medical School (1917-1922) were designed by Ellis Lawrence. In Salem, Lawrence and his associates designed the Masonic Temple (1912), Elsinore Theatre (1926), and the Thomas A. Livesley House (1924) today known as "Mahonia Hall," the official residence of Oregon governors. - https://www.oregonencyclopedia.org/articles/lawrence_ellis_f_1879_1946/

In an article written for the 50th anniversary of our sanctuary, the author writes:

In April of 1926, the foundation was laid for that lovely building in which we just worshiped. Builders must have worked faster then, for the very first service was held only 11 months later.

There was a wedding scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 11th, and the couple had been told the church would be ready. The bride subsequently recalled that as late as 4p.m. the groom didn't know whether to decorate the church or the Parish House. All was ready as promised though. At 9p.m. the best man repaired the lights with a penny in the fuse box and finally Cornelius Tonseth Jr. and Dorothy Maude Ballheim were wed.

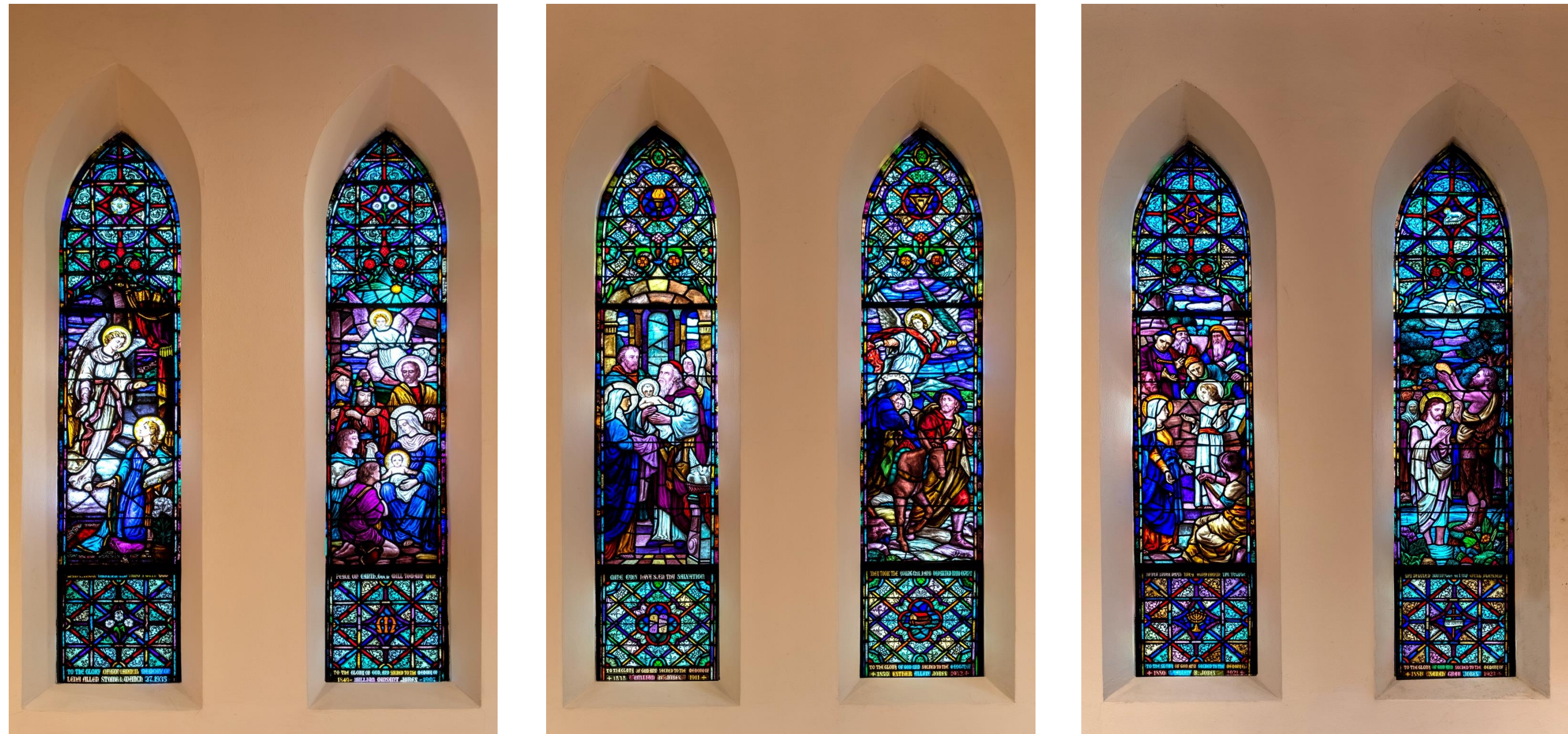
MEMORIAL WINDOWS TO BE DEDICATED SOON.

Handsome Glass Products, Made for Grace Episcopal Edifice Nearing Completion.

Four memorial windows will be unveiled and dedicated in Grace Memorial Episcopal church, Northeast Seventeenth avenue and Weidler street, next Sunday, May 21; the gift of Mrs. Edward George Stoiber, in honor of her sister, Mrs. Esther Allen Jobs; William and Allen R. Jobs, sons of Mrs. Jobs, and Sarah Gray Jobs, wife of Allen.

Mrs. Stoiber, who is now in Italy, is having the windows made in their entirety in Portland by the Pearson Art Glass company. Their installation was planned as a surprise to members of the congregation. They represent scenes in the life of Christ and belong to a series of windows planned for Grace Memorial Episcopal church. Rich in coloring, the windows are being designed and painted by Miss Veronica Eulberg and Miss Margot Helser, Portland girls who studied stained glass art here and in the east.

Mrs. Esther Allen Jobs, whose death occurred about a year ago, worked with the committee which planned the present Grace Memorial church edifice. The building was designed to feature a series of windows. When the four given by Mrs. Stoiber are placed there will be only six left of the 15 planned to be executed for the church.

Lena Anna was a close friend of Rev. Oswald Taylor, Rector of Grace Memorial from 1910 - 1942 and commissioned the windows from W. G. Pearson (Portland) while she was living in Stressa, Italy.

Patriotic Groups Honor Memory of Mrs. E.A. Jobes

To honor the memory of the late Mrs. Esther Allen Jobes and Mrs. W. B. Hall, past regents, officers, directors, members of Willamette chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, and officers of Columbia society, Children of the American Revolution, met at the home of Mrs. U.G. Smith Tuesday afternoon. Following the opening of the meeting the chaplain offered a memorial prayer.

Mrs. Jobes, a past regent of Willamette chapter and an honorary member of Columbia society, was deeply interested in the work of both organizations, it was recounted, and the services she gave will long be remembered. The many ways in which her patriotism and constructive citizenship found expression were told at the meeting. She helped to organize and presented the first flag to Columbia society. She gave also the flag to the first troop of scouts of Grace Memorial church and was an active contributor to the Camp Fire Girls and to the Girl and Boy Scouts. The first living flag in Oregon was founded by Mrs. Jobes, who held membership in the National Flag association.

Having served as library of the national group of the United Daughters of 1812, Mrs. Jobes organized in 1920 the local group and served as president for many years. She was a member, too, of the national society, Daughters of Colonial Wars, and she valued greatly her membership in the Mary Ball society, which was willed to her by her mother, who was a real daughter of the American revolution, and which she in turn willed to her granddaughter Esther Allen.

Mrs. Jobes was a charter member of the Portland Museum association and had a remarkable collection of shells gathered from all parts of the world, which she exhibited generously. She belonged to the Portland Woman's club and was a past director of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. She took an especial interest in the Pioneer Workers' club, in which all members must have been officers in the federation prior to 1900.

Working with others she was an officer in the American Relief association before the world war, and during the war she assisted with relief work in Oregon. Throughout her life she was keenly interested in the W.C.T.U. She was a member of the P.E.O. sisterhood in Portland, the American Women's club in London, England, and one of four Oregon members of the former Washington Sulgrave Institute of England.

Willamette chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, resolved to place as a memorial in its records an account of the achievements of this beloved member, Mrs. Esther Allen Jobes.

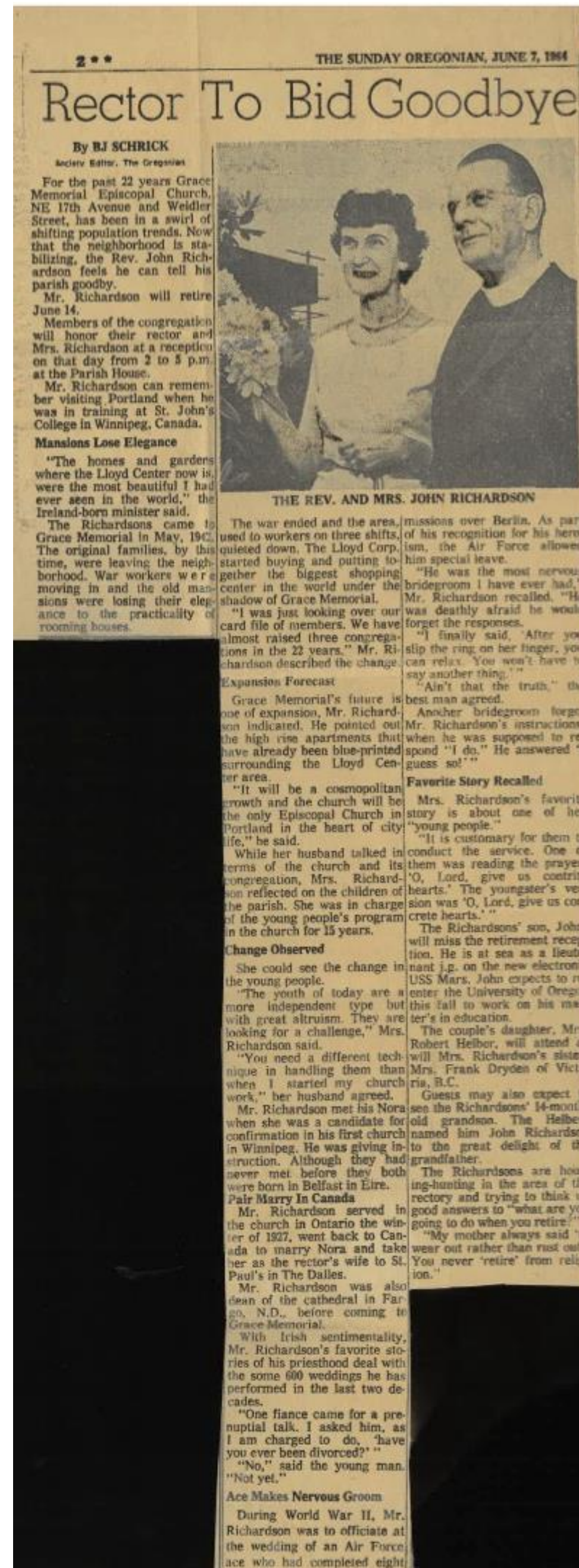

John and Norah Richardson – these were old friends, so let's omit formality – were both born in Belfast, Ireland and both came to Canada. What a happy thing they discovered each other there! After graduation and ordination, our former Rector was invited to Oregon in 1927 by the late Bishop Remington. Five years of conspicuous ministry in Ontario and The Dalles led to his being called to North Dakota where he served briefly in Bismarck at St. George's, thence as Dean of Gethsemane Cathedral at Fargo until May 1942 when he undertook his long and fruitful rectorship of Grace Memorial.

The Richardson era in the life of Grace Memorial consolidated and greatly extended the gains made by a distinguished predecessor, who was memorialized some years ago in the planning of the Oswald Taylor Parish House, a forward step led confidently by Mr. Richardson and dictated by the growth under his leadership in the 1940s. The Richardson ministry was a family affair. Mrs. Richardson's long, devoted work with the church school and youth organization is remembered and witnessed by a host of young Churchmen today. And as the two junior Richardsons, Rosalind (Mrs. Robert Helber) and John Aidan, grew up they were fully present and accounted for in the family life of the Parish.

In a time of striking and sometimes painful change in the life of Portland; in a decade when Grace Memorial Parish moved over from residential to urban character, and when the life of the church moved accordingly, the whole Richardson family was a living testimony to constructive Christian citizenship and leadership, and an asset to the community it claimed as home.

The Parish paid its reverent final tribute to Norah in October 1966, and to John in June 1968.

A committee was authorized by the Vestry to examine the steps necessary for the acquisition of a new and adequate pipe organ for the Church. It has been in conversation with several of the principal organ builders, and other consultants, for several months and has determined the approximate scope and character of a new instrument suitable for the uses of the Church for the next several generations. The committee is now ready to ask your participation and invites the members of Grace Memorial Parish and other friends of the John Richardson family, to make subscriptions toward the purchase and installation of such an instrument.

Considering Mr. Richardson's great awareness of the importance which the supporting musical service bears to the ministry of the Church, and considering the active participation of the Richardson family in making this musical service effective, the committee and the Vestry are agreed that the proposed new pipe organ should be primarily and generally a Richardson Memorial. At the same time, many donors to the organ fund will wish to make their gifts as living memorials to their own loved ones. So the instrument will speak out in years to come as the voice of many who have loved and served the Church, whose hands are stilled but whose influence is not forgotten. The new organ will bear its useful witness in all the services of the Church. At the year-round weekly celebrations; at the dedication of children in baptism; at the reaffirming in confirmation; at the founding of new families in marriage; at the proclamation of hope and triumph at Christian burial. No other single appurtenance of the Church, save the altar itself, can be a more constant and present aid to clergy and people whenever they gather to offer their thanksgivings and to seek the will of God for their lives.

The organ to be installed will be located in the area occupied by the present instrument, but will be so placed as to speak directly into the nave of the church, thereby correcting acoustical deficiencies which exist now. It will be planned to give much better support to the choir and congregation. The instrument will contain about fifteen speaking stops and all mechanical accessory devices which provide complete flexibility at the hands of the organist. It will be designed primarily as an instrument for accompaniment to the services of the church, but will be entirely suitable for limited recital and concert use if that should be desired in the future. The cost of the organ, completely installed, and including the necessary limited construction within the church, will be about \$40,000.

The Committee seeks subscriptions on a three-year basis. Payments spaced over three tax years will enable many donors to give more nearly the amounts they wish than will single cash gifts. Since installation and complete finishing will require twenty months to two years from the date of the contract purchase, pledges made payable over two or three years are entirely practical. Members of the Committee will be happy to discuss any special wishes with prospective contributors.

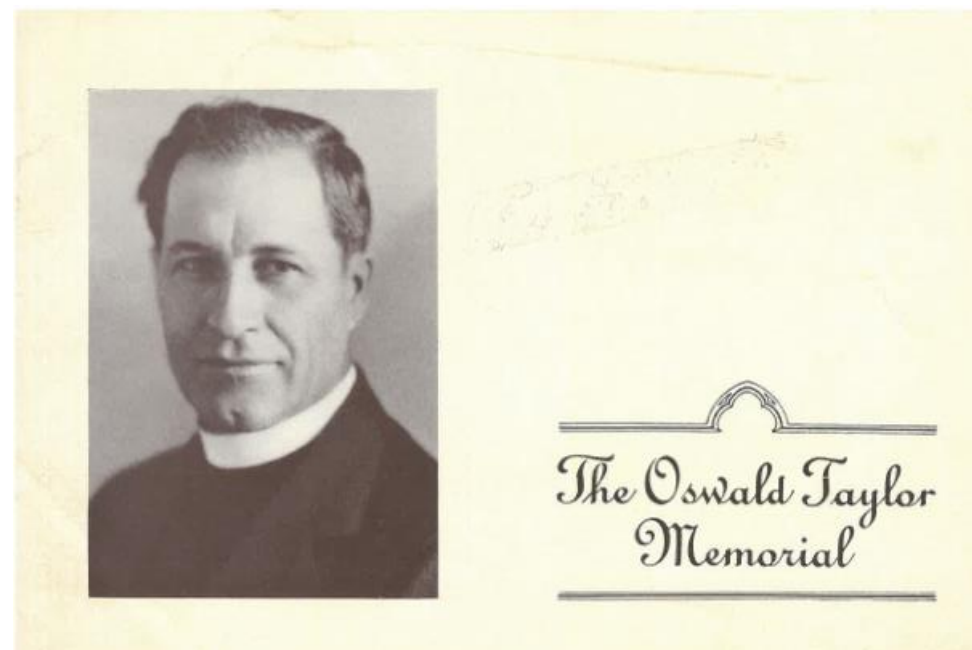

1949 Plan for a Parish House

in memory of Rev. Oswald Taylor – First Rector at Grace



THE REVEREND OSWALD WILLIAM TAYLOR was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, in the year 1878, the second son of James and Annabelle Taylor. He was prepared for the sacred ministry in St. John's College, Winnipeg, was ordained Deacon in 1902 and Priest in 1903.

He began his ministry in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, first as Curate of St. Alben's Pro-Cathedral and later as Rector. He came to the United States in 1906 to take charge of Holy Trinity Church, Wallace, Idaho. Here he did notable work in a difficult field. However, it was in Grace Memorial Parish that the best and most lasting work of his ministry was accomplished.

Coming to Portland in 1909, when Grace Memorial Parish was still in its infancy, Oswald Taylor worked first under the leadership of the Reverend Dr. Van Waters. In a short time he was elected by the Vestry to the rectorship of the Parish. For thirty-two years he labored abundantly in this place. When he first came to the Parish, services were being held in a tent. Under his leadership such progress was made that the building now used as the Parish House was built, and the church services held there. In 1926 the present beautiful church was erected.

Oswald Taylor was a man of rare qualities. He had a genius for attracting friends and binding them to him with strong ties. Those who needed counsel and comfort found in him a strong help. His energies and his gifts were given without reserve to the Diocese and the Community. To many who were not members of the Church, Oswald Taylor symbolized the Episcopal Church here in Portland. As a Pastor, as a friend, as a preacher, as a worker for the welfare of the whole community, Oswald Taylor won and held through the years an honored place. He passed into the Life Unseen March the Seventeenth, 1942.

A Brief Description of the Proposed Parish House

It was the hope of Oswald Taylor that some time there would rise on this spot he so dearly loved such a building as is here planned. A Church and Parish House in one complete unit. Largely through his efforts the beautiful Church was erected, and it is now our privilege to carry out his plan to completion.

THE OSWALD TAYLOR MEMORIAL is designed to harmonize with the beauty and character of Grace Memorial Church. Incorporated in the new building will be all the features of a modern Community Parish House.

The Planning Committee has been mindful of the challenge and the opportunity presented to the Church in the training of the children and young people. Classrooms for church school grades, recreational facilities, small halls for various organizations; all have been provided in the proposed plan.

The distinctive architectural unit of the Memorial Building will be the Main Auditorium. In this wing will be found the Banquet and Social Room, capable of seating, on special occasions, three hundred people. The Auditorium will be provided with a modern stage. Since visual education is now an accepted principle in the training of young people, proper facilities will be provided for the showing of moving pictures. Close to the Auditorium will be a Guild Room with fire-place, a well equipped thoroughly modern kitchen, and placed so as to be accessible to the Main Auditorium.

To permit passage from the Church to the Parish House, and as a protection in inclement weather, the architects have designed an enclosed Cloister, which will be built along the south side of the Church.

The spiritual needs of the Parish have been remembered in the provision of a Memorial Chapel, with a seating capacity for forty people. In this Chapel week-day services will be conducted, and weddings and baptisms performed. The Chapel will always be accessible for meditation and prayer.

Grace Memorial Church is a sacred shrine in which are housed many additional Memorials to departed loved ones. Opportunity will be given for placing a number of Memorials in the new Parish House. If interested, please consult the Planning Committee or the Rector.

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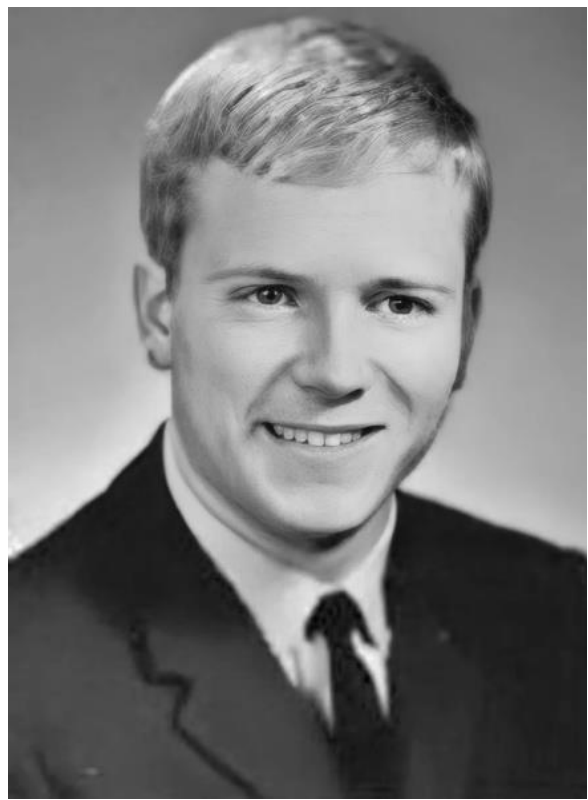

One of the most important groups in any Episcopal church is the Altar Guild. First president of the Guild at Grace Memorial was Ella Brown, a woman small in physical stature but large in character. Though she had lost her hearing as a young girl, Miss Brown was expert at lip-reading. When the new Parish House was built in 1950, the congregation expressed its appreciation for her years of dedication to the church by naming the Fireplace Room the “Ella Brown Room”. Each year, the Altar Guild would on a Silver tea – now a coffee but for most of the year, its members go about their work quietly and efficiently...And all too often unnoticed by the rest of us.

Captain Mason Irwin Burnham was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his heroism and extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight. He served as a Weapons Systems Officer and was assigned to the 421ST TAC FTR SQDN, 366TH TAC FTR WING, 7TH AF. On April 20, 1972, pilot CAPT Thomas H. Amos and navigator CAPT Mason Irwin Burnham were the crew of a U.S. Air Force McDonnell-Douglas F-4D Phantom II (#65-0602), call sign Loggy 02, from the 35th Tactical Fighter Squadron on a night mission in the vicinity of the South Vietnam-Laos border. They were the number two aircraft in a flight of three F-4D's from Da Nang Airfield escorting an AC-130 gunship, call sign Spectre 09, over South Vietnam. During the mission, there was no moon, the weather was clear, and the stars provided the only illumination. The crews completed a 30-minute escort, refueled, then rejoined the gunship. CAPT Amos requested Spectre 09 to select a target for him to expend his ordinance. Spectre 09 located a target (a truck), briefed Amos, and proceeded to mark the target with 40mm gunfire. At 1:27 AM, the crew of Spectre 09 heard Amos report he was lining up on the target. Spectre 09 lost communication with the Phantom crew, and shortly thereafter observed ordinance from the jet explode a mile from the target followed by a large fireball on the ground. Attempts were made to regain radio contact with the Loggy 02 without success. No parachutes were seen, nor emergency signals heard. Aircrews remained in the area through the night conducting a search which produced negative results. Search efforts were suspended April 23, 1972. Because the area was held by hostile forces, no ground search was conducted. Amos was promoted to Major during the time he was missing. On April 24, 1993, a recovery team surveyed the crash site which was determined to be approximately 225 yards inside of Laos. DNA from remains recovered at the site was matched to both of the crew members. - coffeltatabase.org and vietnam.ttu.edu.

On October 1, 1999, the Central Identification Laboratory-Hawaii (CILHI, now DPAA) identified the remains of Captain Mason Irwin Burnham, missing from the Vietnam War. Captain Burnham joined the U.S. Air Force from Oregon and was a member of the 421st Tactical Fighter Squadron. On April 20, 1972, he was the navigator aboard an F-4D Phantom II (serial number 65-0602) on a night escort mission over the southern border of Vietnam and Laos. Captain Burnham's aircraft went down while attacking a target during the mission, and he was killed in the crash. Search and rescue efforts failed to locate his remains at the time. In 1994, a joint U.S./Vietnamese investigative team recovered remains from the Phantom's wreckage that were later identified as those of Capt Burnham. Captain Burnham is memorialized on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific.

His name is also inscribed along with all his fallen comrades on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, DC.
